Songbirds

There are about 10,000 species of birds found around the world and of those, roughly half are songbirds. This type of bird is known for its complex songs which it uses for communication. In some species, the more songs a male knows, the more mates he will attract. Even though some birds, like parrots, can be taught to repeat human speech, songbirds are the only other species that can mimic other species or sounds. These sounds can be pleasant or very harsh-sounding depending on the bird and situation. Songbirds range in size from 0.2 ounces to over a pound. They can be

spotted anywhere from open grasslands to forests. Be sure to look for them in your own backyard. You can also set up a birdfeeder near a window and get an even closer look at our feathered friends.









Birds are always a popular topic!












Be a Cachet Artist
